# Introduction to Jimmy Kennedy



Jimmy Kennedy born on 20th July 1902 in Omagh (Pretoria Terrace now known as the Brookmount area. His mother came from Ardara, Co.Donegal and was a school teacher by profession.



Jimmy's father was Joseph Hamilton Kennedy, a police officer in the RIC, a native of County Derry/Londonderry and former farmer.



Jimmy learned to read & write at the local school, possibly Omagh Model, but as his father was a policeman, the family soon began moving to different locations. Jimmy was a keen scholar with a thirst for knowledge. After primary school, he studied at Cookstown Academy from which he won a university scholarship to Trinity College, Dublin.




In 1907, as the charismatic Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt was gearing up for his 1908 presidential campaign, he embarked on a whirlwind tour across the Middle West. During his travels, Roosevelt took a brief detour to the Dakota Hills for a bear hunting expedition. Amidst the hunt, a bear cub wandered into his sight. The seasoned hunter and nature enthusiast couldn't bring himself to harm the small bear. This touching moment was captured in a popular cartoon that swept across American newspapers, endearing the public even more to their beloved Teddy.

Inspired by the cartoon, Morris Michtom, an enterprising toymaker, crafted a plush toy bear with button eyes and movable arms. He aptly named it the "Teddy Bear" and sought Roosevelt's permission to use his name as a trademark. The Teddy Bear soon became a cherished childhood companion, symbolizing both warmth and compassion.







Fast forward to 1932

When Henry Hall, the direct
Orchestra, was on the besong. One of tidving. When Henry Hall, the director of the BBC Dance Orchestra, was on the hunt for a charming children's song. One day, his colleague Jimmy Kennedy was tidying his desk when Hall inquired about a particular piece of music. Jimmy replied, I've just written words for it, and it's going to be a big hit. True to his word, Jimmy handed the song to Henry Hall, who performed it to great acclaim.

> The very next day, Hall's manager was overwhelmed with requests for copies of the song via telephone calls and telegrams. However, a conflict arose. Jimmy had avoided his manager, Mr Feldman, and directly approached Hall.

As a result, Mr Feldman, feeling slighted, denied Jimmy any royalties from the song. For the next 15 years, from 1932 until Feldman's death in 1947, Jimmy Kennedy received no royalties for his creation.



# Red Sails in the Sunset



In the summer of 1933, Jimmy returned to his hometown of Portstewart for a holiday. One serene evening, he and his sister Nell stood on the doorstep, captivated by the sight before them: the small sailing boat, 'Kitty of Coleraine', with its billowing sails, bathed in the golden evening light pouring down over the distant Donegal hills.

Jimmy turned to Nell and suggested, Why don't you sketch that boat in the magnificent sunset? Nell replied with a playful challenge, Why don't you write a song about it? Nell never painted the sunset, but Jimmy took her suggestion to heart.


The song he wrote captured the beauty and emotion of that moment, resonating deeply with listeners. Over the years, an estimated 53 artists, including legends like Bing Crosby and Perry Como, have recorded *Red Sails in the Sunset*, ensuring its place as a beloved classic in musical history.





## The Hokey Cokey - 1942

In 1939, when war broke out, Jimmy enlisted in the Royal Artillery. As the war affected every aspect of life, this influence is reflected in the songs from that period. While stationed in Wales, Jimmy took leave and traveled to London, visiting a familiar club from his Tin Pan Alley days.



At the club, he encountered a group of Canadian soldiers who began a sing-along. One particular Canadian folk song captivated Jimmy's imagination. Inspired, he later composed his own version of the song and even devised a dance to accompany it. This creation became known as the *Cokey Cokey*, which would later be renamed the *Hokey Cokey*.

## Songwriting Workshop

What Makes a Good Song?



A good song has a melody that you can easily remember. It's like a tune that gets stuck in your head! Think of it as a fun musical line that makes you want to sing along.

### Fun Lyrics:

The words of a song (called lyrics) should tell a story or share feelings. Good lyrics can make you laugh, feel happy, or even make you think. They should be interesting and sometimes even a little silly!

### Rhythm and Beat:

Every good song has a rhythm or beat that makes you want to tap your feet or dance. It's the pattern of sounds that gives the song its energy. A good beat can make you feel excited and ready to move!

### • Emotion:

A great song makes you feel something—whether it's joy, sadness, or excitement. The best songs can touch your heart and help you express your feelings.

### Chorus:

The chorus is the part of the song that repeats, and it's usually the catchiest part. It's like the song's main idea, and it's where you can sing along the loudest! A good chorus sticks in your mind and makes you want to join in.

### Instruments and Sounds:

Different instruments (like guitars, drums, or pianos) add layers to a song and make it unique. A good song mixes different sounds to create a fun listening experience.

### Creativity:

Good songs often have something special that makes them stand out. It could be a cool rhyme, a surprising twist in the lyrics, or an unexpected sound. Being creative helps a song feel fresh and exciting!

### **Remember:**

Every song is different, and what makes a good song can vary for everyone. It's all about what you enjoy! So listen closely, sing out loud, and find the songs that make you happy!



**Timeline Fun Facts About Jimmy Kennedy And His Songs** 



**1902** – Jimmy Kennedy born on 20th July 1902 in Omagh (Pretoria Terrace.

1925 – Obtained an MA degree in Trinity College, Dublin. 1927 – Accepted an appointment with the Colonial Service in Nigeria & took up a temporary job teaching in Dorset while waiting for the appointment to be finalized.

**1933** – 'Teddy Bear's Picnic' was a big hit on both sides of the Atlantic.

**1934** – Saw the publication of the 'Isle of Capri' inspired by an English newspaper report that the famous singer Gracie Fields was on holiday in her villa on the Italian island of Capri.

1935 – 'Red Sails in the Sunset' was a major hit. Jimmy had travelled to Portstewart to visit his parents. As he gazed out to sea from their home on Strand Road, he watched the yacht 'kitty of Coleraine' sail gracefully into Portstewart Bay, its red sails framed in the setting sun. Inspiration for one of his most famous songs!

**1939** – 'South of the Border' was written – the inspiration from Jimmy's sisters Nell & Nina who were travelling in Southern California.



**1940** – Jimmy Kennedy was not Best Man for Dennis Thatcher and his wife Margaret. Jimmy, was best man to Dennis's first marriage to Margot Kempton in 1942 - they were divorced 4 years later in 1946.





**1950** – Jimmy continued to write music throughout the 1950's but his work out was reduced.



**1954** – Jimmy's younger brother Hamilton, also a songwriter. A fatal accident in London cut his career short.



**1960** – Feeling unhappy with a new change in the USA and having to pay extra taxes, Jimmy decided to move to Switzerland.



**1971** – Jimmy received the highest prize in the songwriters guild the Ivor Novello Award for 'Outstanding services to British music'.




**1978** – Jimmy Kennedy received a honoury Doctorate of Letters from the University of Ulster.



**1984** – Jimmy Kennedy died in Cheltenham. Before he died, he was given a special award called an OBE for his great work in music.
